#### Attention Stellar Camera/Sat Tri Veterans of Eniwitok and Pitcairn

As mentioned in several previous newsletters, author **David Stumpf** is working on a third book in his series on the history of Cold-War-era guided missiles. This one will give the history of the development of the Minuteman. He wants to be sure to include the role the Squadron (and others) played in making the trajectory of the Minuteman as accurate as possible, given the various geophysical and payload error-budget considerations for hitting a target over 8,000 miles away from the launch site.

A related topic has come up, for which we seek information, especially from the Stellar Camera/Sat Tri veterans. It has to do with possible GSS surveys near Pitcairn and other island groups in the South Pacific for the purpose of assessing the accuracy of Minuteman tests. The Minuteman went through periodic tests to check how well it could place a dummy warhead on a specified target. **Gordon Barnes** (Acting Commander and Deputy for Ops, FEW, 1975-78) requests this information as input for David's book. Specifically, we are trying to determine how the target coordinates at the various missile test terminal areas were established. At least one Minuteman shot used Oeno Island (also known as Holiday Island) in the Pitcairn Island Group as the terminal area. This shot was in May of 1978. We are aware that the Squadron did work on Pitcairn in the late 1960s and early 1970s, so it would seem logical that they also could have positioned Oeno at the same time, as it lies only about 90 miles to the Northwest of Pitcairn. One article that Gordon found on the Internet states that the LLS. Air Force used Open as a satellite observation station in 1060 and 1070. This may

possibly refer to GSS personnel or, if it was other Air Force personnel, that GSS positioned their observation site.

If there are any GSS veterans of the Stellar Camera/Satellite Triangulation Branch who can shed lite on the surveys accomplished in the South Pacific during the late 1960s-early 1970s, Gordon would like to know the timeframes and instrumentation used to do the positioning; i.e., Stellar Cameras, Geoceivers or both. We have already heard from **Mike DaRonco** (Stellar Camera, FEW, 1967-70), **James Cerar** (Stellar Camera, FEW, 1966-70), and **Doug Young** (Stellar Camera, FEW 1967-71).

We welcome additional input from any of you who participated in surveys at Kwajalin, Eniwetok, Pitcairn or any other South Pacific islands used to test Minuteman accuracy. We'd especially like to hear from Leroy Everitt, Fred Vassau, Larry Adkins, Sig Soli and Loron Hansen. ## Another Request from Gordon

Here's an opportunity for all you GSS veterans who also served in the 1<sup>st</sup> Combat Evaluation Group (1<sup>st</sup> CEvG), especially those of you who supported Skyspot operations in Vietnam. Gordon Barnes also requested information on geodetic control that was provided to support a HIRAN photomapping survey to control Skyspot locations. Here is his request, edited for brevity:

"Hi Guys,

As you both know, and as Julian [Higgins] recently brought to my attention, a lot has been written about Lima Site 85 on Phou Pha Thi Mountain in Laos and the role it played in supporting B-52 operations in SEA under the nickname Combat Skyspot. But nowhere, to my knowledge, has the role of the Photomappers been told. I would like to correct that omission by getting something written and into our archives...I have written on the subject and it now resides on the Photomapper Website under the "Photomapping in S.E.A" button, and then clicking on ACGS Accomplishments. There, among a lot of other things, it will show under project Combat Sky Spot we accomplished six trilateration lines, one astronomic position and one astronomic azimuth. [See <a href="http://1370th.org/sea/acgs.html">http://1370th.org/sea/acgs.html</a> ] My only other involvement with this site was when I used the then classified TACAN station located there as a navigation aid when flying AirBorne Command, Control and Communications missions out of Thailand in the 1967-1969 timeframe. I was not involved with Photomapping at that time.

I would be willing to write the article, if I could get inputs...Thanks in advance for any help on this. We really should get something factual and with enough details to be interesting into our history."

So, Gordon is looking for input from any of you who were on the ground at a Skyspot site during the 1960s, either as GSS or 1<sup>st</sup> CEvG staff, and can recall the who-where-why and when with regard to providing the survey control for this HIRAN survey. *Please reply directly to me (<u>garrettmoore@verizon.net</u>) and to Gordon Barnes (<u>glbjlb@charter.net</u>).* 

## **Deceased Members Update**

The July issue of *The Photomapper*, the newsletter of the *Air Force Photo Mapping Association*, reported the death of one of our mutual veterans, **Ron Knaus** (Orlando, Personnel & Transportation,1959-62). Ron was one of our senior veterans and one of the early members of the original Orlando crew, serving from 1959-61. He was among the handful of flying officers who used to fly our surveyors to their TDY destinations on C-47 "Gooney Birds" and he also served in our higher headquarters, the Air Photographic and Charting Service (APCS). He apparently passed away last May at age 83. I don't have an obituary, but here's his profile from an earlier e-mail conversation I had with him:

"I was assigned as Admin and Personnel Officer and Transportation Officer. I would fly the crews around in an old DC-3 (C-47) over all of USA and much of South America. I was in Photo Mapping for about 7 or 8 years. Spent 3 years in Spain, Some time in Portugal, and several months in Italy. Then I was transferred to APCS then reassigned to the 1381<sup>st</sup>. Stayed there in Orlando for the rest of the time. Then to Korea, Wash DC, and Fort Worth, TX; then I went to work for American Airlines as

a pilot. Worked there for about 30 years. Lived in Long Beach, CA for 25 years, then came to Dallas to retire. I retired in July 1992. Since then, I have lived in Abilene, TX. I operate a ranch, a hunting ranch, and operate a rock quarry, where we break up rocks and make caliche for pavement. I do not live on the ranch, as my wife is a town girl, but we have a nice place on the Fairway Oaks Golf course. And, that's about all of the excitement I can think of."

May he rest in peace...
